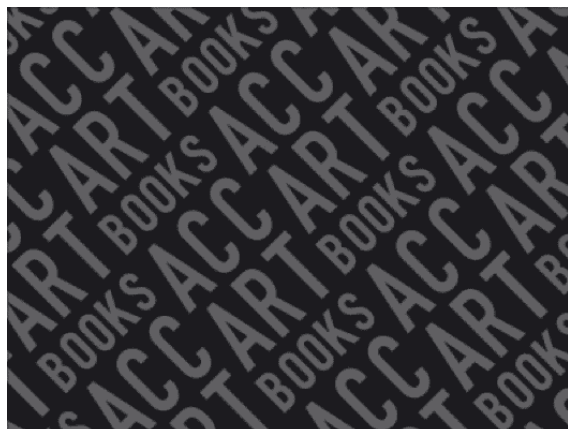

The book shows that Angkor was much more than a collection of temples: it was an extensive and complex urban landscape where much remains to be discovered.
