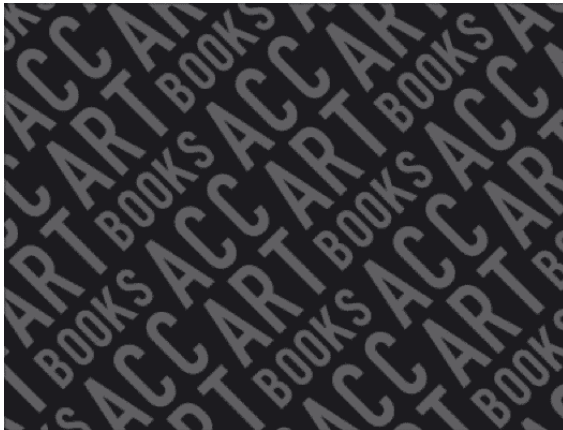




Bauhaus Latin America

Bauhaus Latin America explores the often-overlooked relationship between the Bauhaus and Latin America, offering a fresh perspective on the movement's place within the broader history of modern art. Rather than presenting influence as a one-way journey from Europe to the Americas, the book traces a more nuanced exchange of ideas, examining how Latin American artists travelling through Europe contributed to the intellectual climate of the early twentieth century, and how Bauhaus principles were later reinterpreted through the Concrete and Neo-Concrete movements.

Looking beyond conventional art historical narratives, the publication also considers how many of the values associated with the Bauhaus—geometry, abstraction, craftsmanship and the integration of art into everyday life—echo ideas found within much older Latin American cultures. In doing so, it suggests that artistic innovation rarely belongs to a single place or moment, but emerges through recurring patterns of thought that resurface across different cultures and periods of history. Bringing together new research and richly illustrated examples, *Bauhaus Latin America* contributes a thoughtful new perspective to the study of modernism, revealing the enduring dialogue between Europe and Latin America and encouraging a more interconnected understanding of art history.

Mark Rawlinson is Associate Professor in Art History at the University of Nottingham. His research explores the histories of modern and contemporary art, photography and visual culture, with particular expertise in American modernism, the Bauhaus and transnational artistic exchange. His publications include *Charles Sheeler: Modernism, Precisionism and the Borders of Abstraction and American Visual Culture*, alongside numerous essays on photography, architecture and twentieth-century art. An experienced curator as well as a scholar, Rawlinson has organised exhibitions for institutions including the Djanogly Gallery, the Royal Photographic Society and the Reykjavík Museum of Photography. His long-standing research into the Bauhaus and global modernism has challenged conventional narratives of artistic influence, examining the movement through broader international networks and histories. **Jonathan Casciani** is a publisher, curator and writer specialising in modern and contemporary art.
