**Luis Miguel Dominguín** (1926–1996) was one of the most celebrated and charismatic bullfighters of the 20th century, renowned for his elegance, intelligence, and commanding presence in the arena. Born in Madrid into a legendary bullfighting dynasty, he was the son of Domingo Dominguín, himself a respected matador. **Georges Boudaille** (1925–2007) was a French art critic, historian, and curator who played a significant role in promoting modern and contemporary art in the second half of the 20th century. **Pablo Picasso** (1881–1973) was one of the most influential and prolific artists of the 20th century, widely regarded as a pioneer of modern art. Born in Málaga, Spain, he showed extraordinary artistic talent from a young age and received formal training in Barcelona and Madrid before settling in Paris, where he spent most of his career.
