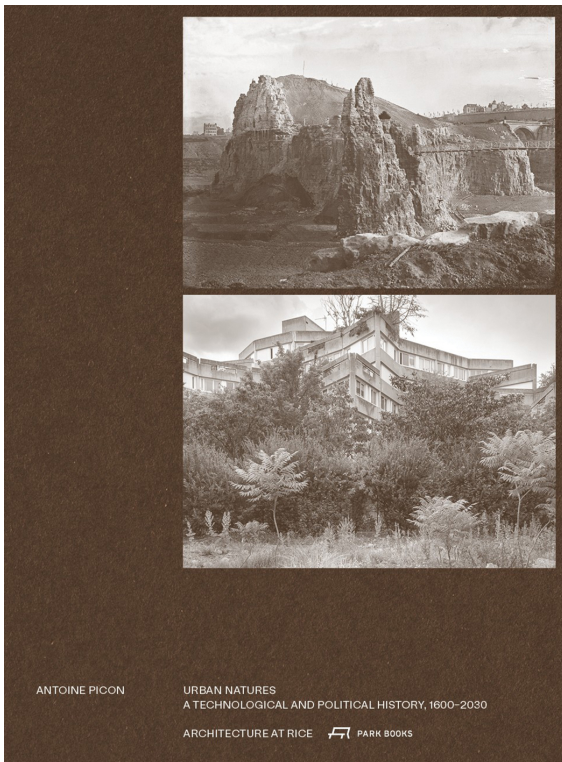




Urban Natures

For more than 300 years, we have been exploring the role of nature in urban development. Since the Age of Enlightenment, urban nature has also been closely intertwined with concerns about hygiene and efforts to mitigate economic inequalities and social divisions. This common thread of urban planning has shaped transformations such as Paris under Baron Haussmann and the creation of New York's Central Park. To this day, the evolution of urban nature runs hand-in-hand with changing ideas of society.

First published in French in 2024, **Urban Natures** highlights how urban nature has gained importance over centuries and reached an entirely new dimension in our age of global warming and climate crisis. It demonstrates the urgency to forge new connections between people and their environment: with soil, water, vegetation, and animal populations. And it illustrates how far we have already come and invites us to be innovative about our cities' future.

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
