Jean-Luc Chalumeau is an art critic and historian; he teaches art interpretation at the Institut des carrières artistiques (ICART). He directed the journal *OPUS International* from 1981 to 1995, and then the journal *Verso Arts et Lettres* until 2010. He is also the author of numerous monographs published by Cercle d'Art, including *Fauvism* and *Signac* in the *Let's Discover Art* collection, as well as writings on art such as *The New Figuration*, *The X Pop*, *The Force of Art*, *History of Contemporary Art* (Klincksieck), and now *Van Gogh*.
