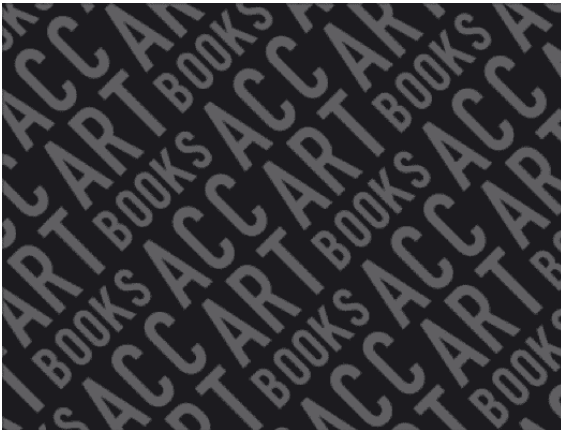




Woodcut Women

This is the first book to shine a spotlight on a remarkable group of British women who, in the first half of the 20th century, mastered the art of colour woodcuts in the Japanese tradition. Inspired by masters like Hokusai and Hiroshige, these women broke new ground by designing, cutting, and printing their own works – a bold departure from the traditional reliance on teams of skilled craftsmen. Although the process was demanding, little was required in the way of equipment which enabled women to pursue the craft at home, bringing the craft into the modern age. This book uncovers a neglected chapter of art history – a story of creativity, resilience, and innovation – bringing to life the challenges and triumphs of women who carved out their own artistic paths.

James Trollope is a writer and curator with a passion for uncovering overlooked talents of 20th-century British art. He has written four acclaimed monographs, including *Rudolph Ihlee: The Road to Collioure* — the first in-depth study of an artist who shared the Slade School with Stanley Spencer and Mark Gertler. James has also celebrated the work of leading printmakers Eric Slater, Arthur Rigden Read, and Sir Frank Short, curating exhibitions of their art in both England and France. A regular contributor to ArtUK's Stories, he brings deep knowledge and an engaging style to everything he writes. **Hannah Brocklehurst** is the Curator of European & Scottish Art & Portraiture at the National Galleries of Scotland.
