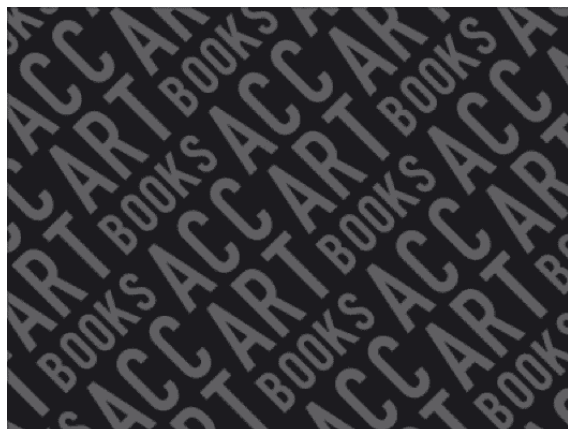




Born in the Clay
